





Phuket, Thailand is on the Andaman Sea - the city has been described as beautiful, exotic, and unique. For over two thousand years it has been a major stop over between China and India - there are 29 major Buddhist temples in the area - 75% of the population are Buddhists



THE MIDDLE EAST

Muscat (Mina Qabos), Oman.


Muscat has been a crucial seaport for about 24 centuries.

It is on the trade route between East and West. A major clash began in 1507 when Portugal tried to dominate the route to the Indian Ocean.

Since the 17th century it has been ruled by the Al Said Dynasty.

The large ship in the harbor is owned by the Sultan.

Note the intricate sidewalks along the water.



Some views of Dubai - Their legacy goes back 50 centuries when the Magan civilization sailed between the Mediterranean Sea and the Indian Ocean trading copper. Dubai likes to show off it's lavish side with displays of grandeur, beauty and opulence. The **2,722 foot tower** in Dubai is the tallest in the world - their **Ferris wheel** at 750 feet is the tallest in the world - the **Burj Al Arab Hotel**, shaped like sail, is the tallest all suite hotel in the world over water. And it goes on and on.



Aqaba, Jordan

The city is on the northeastern tip of the Red Sea that was founded in about 1300 B.C. by ancient people known as the Edomites. It is Jordan's only seaport. Aqaba is near the ancient city of Petra. Also near by is Wadi Rum, a desert area inhabited by the Bedouins. T.E. Lawrence set up camp here. The 1962 classic film "Lawrence of Arabia" was filmed here.



The Suez Canal is a 120 mile long sea level canal that connects The Mediterranean Sea with The Red Sea. It is a vital trade link between Europe and Asia. Originally built by a French company in the mid 1800s, it is now owned and operated by Egypt. About 100 ships can go through a day. We entered at about 6:00 AM and entered the Mediterranean around 5:00 in the afternoon



The Dead Sea in Israel is the lowest place on earth - about 2,500 hundred feet below sea level. As there is no outlet, the water from the Jordan River just evaporates - the salt remains and the sea becomes more salty - it is so salty that one floats on the surface - the level of the sea is dropping about a yard per year



Kusdasi, Turkey

This city is a port in Turkey that is the gateway to Ephesus, the site of the ruins of a former Roman provincial capital. Among the sites is a Roman theatre that seated 25,000. The Ephesus museum has an extensive collection of artifacts from the ruins of Ephesus.

It is an honor being his *Girl Friday* by compiling these logs for him.



The Caves of Diros - near Gythion, Greece.

The caves are very extensive - they say many sections still have not been explored. One rides through a small boat with just six per boat - an oarsman guides you thru silently - some of the stalactites and stalagmites are very large and spectacular.



Ravenna, Italy, on Italy's West Coast - south of Venice. The city dates back to 2 B.C., when it was colonized by the Romans. It was the capital of the Western Roman Empire three times. The Basilica de San Vitale, designed on a traditional Byzantine octagonal floor plan, contains what is considered to be the most impressive Byzantine mosaics in the Western World. The city also is the site of the tomb of Dante, the famous poet and writer who is considered the originator of the modern Italian language. He lived his final years here.



Pictures from **The Republic of San Marino**. San Marino is a small country entirely within the borders of Italy. It is the third smallest country in Europe after Monaco and Andorra. With a population of 33,500, it is up in the Apennine Mountains at an elevation of 2500 feet near the Adriatic Coast. The picture of the building is the seat of government in the Palazzo Pubblico. San Marino is considered to have the earliest written governing documents still in effect. They go back to 1600.





Kotor, Montenegro is an UNESCO World Heritage Site. It is on the Adriatic Sea. The city was first settled by the Ancient Romans as early as the fifth century B.C. The name Montenegro means “Black Mountains”. The first picture shows the city and our cruise boat. It was taken from a cliff high above the city. The cliffs go up about 2,000 feet.

The ancient town square of Kotor. St Typhon Cathedral was completed in 1166 and boasts fascinating Romanesque and Byzantine architecture.

Malta is an independent country less than the size of Washington, DC. It is strategically located between Sicily and North Africa. Due to the location, it has been captured and ruled by (among others) the Byzantine Empire, the Arabs, Normans, Germans, French and Spanish. It was a British colony until granted independence after WWII. The capital city of Valletta has an excellent, well-fortified harbor. Its colossal architectural monuments helped turn Valletta, the smallest capital in the EU, into a UNESCO World Heritage Site.

Taormina, Italy (Sicily)

A coastal resort town since Roman times. From Taormina one is treated to a magnificent view of Mt Etta. Frequently shrouded in clouds; we were fortunate to have the view in the picture.



Also in Taormina are the ruins of an ancient Greek/Roman Theatre, built in the 3rd century, B.C. See the picture of one of the standing walls. The sitting area is preserved and used for concerts.

A day in Rome. Rome was founded in April, 753 B.C. It lies on The Tiber River in the middle of Italy on the East coast. Estimated population is almost three million.



The Castle of Angels, on the Tiber River. The Castle dates back 2000 years to the time of Emperor Hadrian.

The Colosseum. It was used by Emperors to entertain the public with spectacular games.



St Peter's Square on a very busy day. The Pope was scheduled to address the gathering.

Eze is in Southern France, between Nice and Monaco. In 1338, the House of Savoy took charge and fortified it. The village is located on a cliff about 1500 feet above the water.

Next port: We docked in **Marseille, France**. The city is a very import seaport.

First stop on a tour was Avignon to see *The Cathedral of The Popes*. Nine Popes resided in Avignon during the the Great Schism, that lasted from 1309 to 1378.

A Roman aqueduct (nearby Pont du Gard) dating back to 40 A.D. It carried 44 million gallons of water a day. It remains in remarkably good condition. The Romans were very good builders.

The Rhône River at Avignon. The Pont d' Avignon across the river was built in 1177. A portion still stands.



Barcelona, Spain:

is a fascinating city to visit. While it is part of Spain, it considers itself apart from Spain. There are two official languages in Barcelona - Spanish and Catalan. Our tour guide jokingly said there really are three because English is so widely spoken.



The La Sagrada Familia is regarded as architect Antonio Gaudi's masterpiece. Started in 1882, work continues to this day.

The Montjuïc/Olympic Stadium hosted the 1992 Olympic Games.

The narrow streets of Barcelona: The Gothic Quarter is the center of the old city. There are many narrow streets there, many dating back to medieval times. Foot traffic has to make way for passing cars.



Saturday, April 15, we visited **Malaga, Spain**. Malaga is on the Southern, Mediterranean Coast of Spain. It has a history that goes back 28 centuries. It was founded by the Phoenicians in 770 B.C. It became a Roman colony 550 years later and flourished through the centuries. After passing through the Straits of Gibraltar, we were on our way to Casablanca, Morocco.

April 16th found us in **Casablanca**. We took a 3 & 1/2 hour scenic trip through the countryside to **Marrakech**. Founded in 1070 Marrakech was once considered an important political and cultural center. Now, the city is the most popular destination in **Morocco**.

First picture is the 12th century *Koutoubia Mosque*. It is the largest in **Marrakech**. It is richly decorated with floral designs. At 203 feet, the minaret is one of the oldest in the world. No building in the city is permitted to be taller.



The ceilings in the **Bahia Place**: Built between 1894 and 1900, the name means “*Palace of the Beautiful*”. Rich mosaics may be found throughout the palace. The King of Morocco is occasionally in residence.

Canary Islands:

The islands are a semi-autonomous region of Spain. Spanish sovereignty has been recognized since 1479. Population of the islands is about two million. They lie west of Africa with the closest island just 62 miles off the coast of Morocco. They are a favorite vacation destination for many Europeans due to their favorable sub-tropical climate. In the most of the islands, the temperature is usually in the 70s year round. Our first stop was the island of Lanzarote. This is the island closest to Morocco.
